### PARISH COUNCIL

The monthly meeting took place on 28th July 2010. Apologies for absence were received from Mrs Figgis, Mrs Taylor and the Clerk. The Chairman and the Clerk were ably replaced by Mr Chapman and Mrs Geliot respectively.

The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 30th June were signed as a true record.

**Matters arising:** the retaining brick wall at the old school development is at present, being repaired.

**Reports:** the footpath between Staple Street and Boughton has now been cut back, and landowners are reminded of their responsibilities for maintaining their boundary hedges. At the same time, dog walkers should respect livestock in fields, and be prepared to use leads on their animals.

**Kent Pond Warden Scheme:** the Parish Council has enthusiastically supported this initiative. Now, how-


ever, the Parish Council has been issued with a slightly heavy handed "request" for £100. This sum represents ten days work on ponds in this area, and 500 hours of labour costs. This is the first intimation that such a large charge is to be made for work related to this scheme. The Parish's Precept is set in December of each year, and the figure of £100 is considered to be too large to absorb into this year's funding. It was agreed to defer the problem until towards the end of the financial year, and to examine the availability of funds then.

**Correspondence:** it was decided unanimously that the proposed sites suggested for gipsy sites had totally inadequate access routes. Michael Woods, the Village Tree Warden, is to meet the Area Tree Warden next week to look at trees in both private and public gardens.

There being no further business, the Chairman declared the meeting to be closed at about 8.30 p.m.

### FABRIC COMMITTEE REPORT

There has been some progress since the Fabric Committee's report last April.

**External Quinquennial Repairs:** Additional funding of £5,000 has been received from Marshall's Charity Trust. All we need now is just over £1,000.00.

The PCC at a recent meeting agreed

that the repair work to the external envelope to the church should start despite the shortfall. The contractors, S and T Fullers of Faversham, have arranged for the scaffolding to be erected during the week commencing 26<sup>th</sup> July 2010. Preliminary work will commence shortly afterwards. However it has been arranged for a "Bee"-man to remove the bees from within

the stonework prior to the builders commencing work. The organ will be sheeted over to protect it from dust etc whilst the roof above it is being repaired. The organ will still be useable.

The hours of Fullers work will be between 8.00am and 5.00pm. Any unknown person(s) seen around the church out of these hours should be questioned or reported to the police.

**Disabled Toilet Facility:** Our Archi-

tect, Robert George, has completed detailed plans and a specification for the disabled toilet and the changes that are necessary for such a provision. This information has been forwarded to the DAC for approval and subsequent faculty application. Details have also been passed to contractors for obtaining cost estimates. From these the total cost of the toilet project can be established.


ed to take its toll. Next day we discovered that 15 people had been playing cards without the 4 of diamonds in the pack. It was under the bench.

Second thoughts...Does it matter, no steeple?


It has one of the loveliest towers,
