PARISH COUNCIL

The monthly meeting of the Parish Council took place on Wednesday 25th January. With the exception of Mrs Geliot, who sent apologies, all Councillors were present, as were Mr G Bobbin, two members of the public and the Clerk. The minutes of the meeting held on 30th November

2011 were signed as a true record. **Matters arising:** it was noted that Wellside is still in an unkempt state; however, the Parish Council is not responsible for it. The matters at the Black Oast have been resolved in as far as the Parish Council is concerned.

Reports: Mr Woods agreed to obtain quotes for the crown-lifting of the Village Green oak tree. The work will probably take place in the Spring. He also commented favourably on the Christmas Tree on the Village Green and wondered whether it could be made an annual fixture. EDF are to be warned about the dangerous height of trees grow-



ing through power lines at Fairbrook. The Queen's Diamond Jubilee in June: there appear to be various schemes afoot already and villagers are encouraged to join in. The Chairman pointed out that time is shortening

and all should try to make the day a success.

The Clerk has received a letter from Swale's Head of Community Services to the effect that it is considering the setting up of a Local Loan Fund to support voluntary, community and social enterprise sectors in the area. Applications to join in this initiative should be made before Friday 2nd March. Loans will only be granted to organisations and not to individuals. Any organisation interested can obtain details on reference to the Clerk.

The footpath down to the Fostall is again in need of attention and Mr Morsman will inform the appropri-

ate Department This he has already done twice, but so far without success. The resident adjacent to the old Silver Sand Nursery site in the Thanet Way area reported very little progress in his efforts to eject the squatter there. This matter has continued now for a number of months, with few signs of completion.

The Clerk is to write to Cllr. Bowles, protesting strongly over the proposed closure of the Salter Lane rubbish collection site. He is also to mention that the sites for placement of the speed restriction signs should be (1) at the top of Church

Hill and (2) at a point to be decided later somewhere between the junction of Church Hill and Staple Street, and a point along the road leading to the Mount Ephraim entrance. It is very difficult to decide exactly where the sign should go, as the whole stretch is treated as a speed track. If the sign is a mobile one, it should not be difficult to locate it elsewhere if the original placement proves to be faulty.

There being no further business, the Chairman declared the meeting closed at 8.55pm.

RESTORATION FUND ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2011

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The Restoration Fund Committee began its first year of operation in 2007. It had two particular targets to meet. One was to raise awareness of the importance of St. Michael's Church to the community and to the landscape. The second was to raise funds to restore the fabric where the architects report (the Quinquennial) identified that deterioration had occurred. This specific work of restoration, which will have cost nearly £160,000, is now in its final phase. Although there is still work to be done and money to be found, the goal is in sight. With your sustained help, with one final effort, we will see the end of this project by the end of this year.

A report from the Fabric Committee is included. Not only have Malcolm and Jan been supervising the work of the builders, they have been getting grants from a number of charities for the restoration work. You can also see that a number of improvements have been made to church facilities in

parallel with and in addition to the work of restoration.

It seems that new materials will now allow the continuous re-painting of the Forth Bridge to be a thing of the past. We don't have that possibility. We are dealing with a building that was built before Henry VIII was born. Inevitably there will be other parts of the fabric to repair or replace that are not in the present list. These will have to be addressed as they come to light, but for the moment we can be pleased that one very big project is nearly done. With your continued help, the Restoration project is expected to be completed by the end of 2012. With that belief, the Committee has decided that it will retire at the end of the year, its tasks fulfilled.

On behalf of the Committee I would like to thank you for all your wonderful support in the past. Please make 2012 another successful year for us.

FABRIC COMMITTEE REPORT
Quinquennial Repairs, 2011 saw the completion of phase 1 of the project. This included all the work requiring scaffolding, that is, all necessary repairs to the tower down to the lower level and to the porch. Additionally repairs were carried out to the roof of the vestry (ex-organ chamber) and the replacement of the rainwater goods. Work outstanding ie phase 2, covers replacement and repairs to stonework at lower level of the tower to include the West Door and to the lower level windows and buttresses.
Additional to the offer of £13,000

from Viridor Environmental Company, an offer of £5,000 has been received from Colyer-Fergusson Charitable Trust.

Disabled Toilet Facilities. 2011 saw the completion of the disabled toilet together with the baby changing facility and the kitchenette area. This proves to be a welcome asset and helps to provide more opportunity for increasing the use of the church. We must thank the Architect, Robert George and the contractors B W May for their hard work in bringing the project to a successful conclusion.

TREASURER'S REPORT

2011 has been another very successful year for the Restoration Fund. Events we have held were a Beetle Drive, which raised nearly £400; a smaller art exhibition than last year, but which still produced over £160; a cake stall at Faversham Market made £782, and the B-B-Q Breakfast in September raised over £600. In October the UK Paper Brass Band entertained us in the church and, in spite of a rather small audience, we made nearly £170.

Other fund-raising included the sales of; books (£110), plants (£150), a cake stall at the Open Gardens (nearly £470), and stalls at the Flower Festival raised a magnificent £621. At Easter, we were again given a giant chocolate egg to raffle which realized over

£65.

Brian Jelfs once more produced a high quality calendar which shows off the work of local artists. He also had the designs printed as cards. Thanks to his efforts he has made a profit of over £560 so far. There will be further income paid into the account, and there are cards still available for sale, so this amount will increase during 2012.

Donations have totalled over £2,660, and Gift Aid for the donations in 2010 and in 2011 contributed a further £1,594.

Many thanks are due to all the organisers and contributors of the above. As a result, £8,353 has gone into the accounts for 2011.

The first phase of restoration work has been completed, and phase two begun. We have paid out £72,199 so far for this work. In ad-

dition to local fund-raising we have had £13,576 of the VAT payments returned to us, and had grants of £36,000 from various bodies.

It is a huge task for a small village like Hernhill to maintain an ancient building so thank you to everyone who has supported our fund raising efforts during the year and please continue your support through this coming year.

A belated happy Christmas and New Year to everyone.

We are extremely grateful to the Queenborough Fishery Trust and Councilor Bowles (through the KCC Community Fund) for the generous donations made to the Village Hall that enabled us to press ahead with the kitchen refurbishment. This has just been completed for us by Jask Builders to their usual high standard of work. I am sure those of you who have already seen it "in progress" will be very impressed. We believe that this now moves the Village Hall into the 21st Century! I would also like to thank Joy Pritchard, Joy Congdon and Liz Walton (plus others) for helping sort out the old crockery etc and select/locate the new crockery for the kitchen. The new "Range Cooker" and Fridge will help those using the

kitchen for events etc to reheat/keep cool food. We have also added in a "recycling" area with bins to segregate waste for recycling and a can and bottle crusher to reduce waste volume. A storage cupboard has been included for cleaning materials and all the cupboards have pull out drawers or corner systems that avoid reaching back into them to select items or store items with everything on view. We also took the opportunity to raise the floor level to remove the step down into the kitchen making it easier to enter for all concerned. If you have not been to the Village Hall recently, why not pop along and have a look. We think that you will be pleasantly surprised! It is hoped that this upgrade will encourage more villagers to use the hall facilities in the future as it's now a much more light and airy hall and is probably one of the cheapest to hire in the area. FROM THE VICAR

Lent which begins on 22 February is often seen, sadly I think, as a

negative time of year when you are meant to give up chocolate or alcohol or yelling at the children. I

prefer to think of Lent as a positive time, a time of spring cleaning and of growth, a time to take stock of our relationship with God and with each other.

For Christians the relationship with God is one of friendship, not master/slave or monarch/subject. It may sound very presumptuous to say God is my friend but Jesus in John's gospel tells his disciples they are his friends not his servants, if we are Christians then we are disciples (which means learners) and therefore friends.

Our friendship with God grows, and is maintained, through prayer. We don't have to go through elaborate rituals to communicate with God, neither do we have to talk all the time, just as with earthly friends sometimes it is enough simply to be together. Just as with human friendship, our friendship with God will have seen many changes over the years. As with human friendship our friendship with God needs time spent on it, (but not just once a year!) and it means listening as well as talking,

prayer is a telephone not a Dictaphone. We have two ears but only one mouth and should try using them in those proportions. Learning to listen to God takes time as we learn to recognise his voice and the many and varied ways in which he speaks to us.

Why not use the time of Lent to deepen your friendship with God? It will take time and effort but that is part of what Lent is about. You could read a Christian book that will enlarge your understanding of God or of being a Christian. You could spend more time in prayer and quiet reflection, go to an extra service in church, take yourself out for a walk or do random (or planned) acts of kindness. Your friendship with God will grow more deeply and more quickly than you imagine. The word 'Lent' is connected with 'growth,' how about making a conscious effort for this Lent to be a time of growth for you and God together?

If you see the Faversham Times, you will be aware of their front-page concern for the future of the household waste recycling centre at Salters Lane, Faversham. There is some concern that if it closes, there might be an increase in fly-tipping. Whatever the truth of that, there is certainly a blight of it in this Village. Most recently there was a load of builders waste dumped on the corner between Woodlands and Godfrey's Grave. There are frequently loads dumped on the road between Dargate and Dunkirk and there has been an unsightly mess at the en-

Fly tipping is not the only nuisance. There have been complaints about dogs fouling the footpaths, cats digging up flowers and the constant problem of litter. To think, we have been winners of the 'Best Kept Village in Kent'. That was long ago but if there is anything you can do as an individual to improve things, we will all benefit.
