

# HERNHILL NEWS JULY 2010

### **PARISH COUNCIL**

The monthly meeting of the Council took place on 30th June. With the exception of Mr Chapman, who was on leave, and Borough Councillor Mr Bobbin, all other Councillors were present, as was the Clerk.

The minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 26th May were signed as a true record.

Matters arising: Car parking at the Church Hill/Staple Street junction - following the report of last month's meeting, the situation at this dangerous point appears to have marginally improved. The proposed gipsy site on the Thanet Way - under the new administration at Whitehall a certain level of democratic choice by local authorities will, in future, be made locally, rather than by Governmental decree.

Reports: Mrs Taylor spoke of the dangerous state of hedging and verges in Dargate, and other Councillors mentioned similar situations throughout the parish. These have been attended to by Highways once this year, and the Clerk is to contact that Department demanding some

immediate action. Mr Elliott spoke of the large heap of spoil left on site at the old school development. A suggestion was made that Swale's Planning Department be made aware of this. Mr Morsman made an alternative proposal - that the builders responsible for the construction of the site be approached to ascertain the firm's future intentions. This proposal was adopted. Mrs Figgis announced that the school would welcome all villagers who may be interested in visiting on the Open Morning.

The Clerk reported the satisfactory conclusion of the 2009/10 audit. This is some 4 to 5 months faster than usual, and is mainly due to the advice of the Council's External Auditor (See later).

**Correspondence:** the grant application for the building work recently carried out at the Village Hall has been passed to the relevant authorities.

**Planning:** the planning application by Moneypeak, at Waterham Nurseries which had been rejected by both the Parish Council and Swale

BC, had its appeal upheld by the Planning Inspectorate. What had appeared to be valid arguments made by the Parish Council were largely ignored and overturned by that body. Permission has been granted in respect of a timber conservatory at Sutherland House Sta-

ple Street, and for extensions at 4, Monkshill Cottages. A side extension at 8, Swale View has been refused permission on the grounds that its projection, size and design would have an adverse effect on neighbouring property.

### **AUDIT COMMISSION**

At last, some good and cheerful news on the Audit Commission front. Instead of prolonged nitpicking, I have received the completed Audit Form. Bearing in mind that it usually arrives with my Christmas cards, this is a considerable achievement. Only one proviso was imposed - I ought to have included Councillors' and the Clerk's application for subsistence claims in Box 6 of the Audit Form, not in Box 4. Since no Councillor, nor myself, has ever made a claim for subsistence in over 20 years, (and I doubt that the late Clerk would have permitted such a liberty) I have to wonder from which area of Cloud 9 the Audit Commission managed to dream up this complaint.

The secret of my success was suggested by our External Auditor, who

said that as much unnecessary information as possible should be included with the Audit Form. Accordingly, 14 extraneous photocopies of insurance policies, letters to and from insurance companies. copies of 12 monthly bank statements and other trivia from the bank. This ridiculous ploy worked. for it was all returned with a very curt note - "This information has not been examined, and was not asked for".

I was delighted to read that Eric Pickles, the new Administration's Chief Executioner for Quangos, is to concentrate on the Audit Commission, at its headquarters in Plymouth. A ritual place of dismemberment would ideally be on Plymouth Hoe, and I have already booked a front seat.

#### FROM THE VICAR

'Jesus is Lord' we happily sing in our Sunday services or we use 'Lord' in our prayers almost as a punctuation mark, it is such a familiar phrase but what does it mean? To many people today the word 'Lord' conjures up an eccentric old relic from a bygone age opening his stately home to all comers in order

to survive. Or do we think of the 'House of Lords,' people who through an accident of birth or political patronage are elevated above their peers? One of the dictionary definitions of 'Lord' is 'master, ruler, chief, prince, sovereign,' and that is nearer to a Christian understanding of the word than the first two pictures.

'Jesus is Lord' was the earliest and simplest of all Christian creeds but wrapped up in 'Lord' for them was the idea of Yahweh (printed LORD in our Bibles) as well as earthly rulers who demanded allegiance. When early Christians refused to say, 'Caesar is Lord,' they knew it was no courtesy title that Caesars claimed, but a title that implied his right to receive divine honours and in that sense they could give the title to no-one but Jesus.

One of the most challenging verses for me in the Bible is found in Luke 6:46, 'Why do you call me 'Lord, Lord' and not do what I tell you?' If we call Jesus 'Lord' we need to understand how that impacts on our daily lives as Christians.

To help us think through the lordship of Jesus in different aspects of our lives we are having a sermon series starting in July titled, 'Jesus Lord of my life' and will look at areas such as our time, our giving and our fellowship. Hopefully we will never be forced to give lordship to any earthly ruler but one early Christian who we know refused to was Polycarp. Polycarp lived in the second century and was arrested on the charge of being a Christian. The Roman proconsul took pity on this old and gentle man and urged him to proclaim, 'Caesar is Lord,' Polycarp only needed to make this declaration and offer a small pinch of incense to Caesar's statue to escape torture and death. Polycarp refused to compromise his beliefs and was burned alive at the stake. Polycarp, like many other Christians to this day, was only able to die for Christ because he lived for Christ. What a challenge for us!

# **Alpha**

Alpha is an opportunity for anyone to explore the Christian faith in a relaxed setting over ten thoughtprovoking weekly sessions with a day away one Saturday. Over 7,000 courses are currently running across the UK in rural and urban settings. We are planning to run an Alpha course in the autumn, day, date, venue, time all to be decided. If you are interested in finding out more about Christianity then you are very welcome to come along. Alpha is also the course to do if you are interested in being baptised and/or confirmed as a teenager (school year 8 and above) or an adult. Alpha is a safe place in which to ask questions and if, after a few weeks you decide Alpha is not the course for you there is no pressure to finish the course.

Each session consists of a meal together followed by a talk and small group discussion. There is no charge for the course but you are invited to give a donation towards the cost of the meal.

It was a perfect summer afternoon in the water gardens at Mount Ephraim as glasses were raised and a bench unveiled in memory of Mary Dawes.


Mrs Dawes, known as Miz, restored the gardens at Hernhill with her husband Bill in a labour of love which lasted some 40 years.


