PARISH COUNCIL

The Annual Meeting took place on Wednesday 28th April. Present were Mrs Figgis, Mrs Taylor, Mr Chapman, Mr Morsman, Ward Councillor Andrew Bowles, and the Clerk.

The minutes of the meeting held on 31st March were signed as a true record.

Matters arising: the Chairman commented on the speed with which the parish's potholes had been repaired and thought most of the worst examples had been mended.

Reports: Gordon Ottaway, muchrespected Chairman of Boughton Parish Council, has died recently; Mr Morsman considered that a letter of sympathy be sent to Boughton Councillors, as most of Hernhill's Councillors had known of his fine reputation. An excellent report has been received from Crispin Whiting, a beautifully-produced document detailing his first few months as Village Pond Warden. He remarks on his good fortune in having the County Amphibian Recorder for Kent, and the ecologist Amy Wright, living in adjacent parishes at Dunkirk and Boughton. Mr Whiting's enthusiasm shows through in his report, and the Parish Council is grateful for his valuable services.

Mrs Figgis commented on the most recent actions at Boughton Hill, and it would appear that some concrete action is at last imminent.

Planning applications: no seriously adverse comments had been offered on the four planning proposals: the Manor House - wrought-iron gates (there were comments critical of retrospective approval) 4, Monk's Hill Cottages, Waterham - single-

storey extension; Pear Tree Cottage. Dargate - rear extension and Sutherland House, Staple Street conservatory. A recently received application was also discussed at length - the construction of B1, B2 and B8 industrial units in linear blocks, proposed by Cedar Holdings (UK) Ltd. on the derelict site at the Duke of Kent. All Councillors were resigned to the fact that a development would take place here, sooner or later, but this application before the Parish Council was not the answer. All Councillors mentioned the superfluity of industrial sites on, and leading from, the A299 Thanet Way, many of which were empty and out of use generally. One Councillor pointed out the incipient dangers of increased road traffic, which could be in the HGV class. One Councillor considered that, if the site is to be developed eventually, then residential housing, perhaps cheaper rural housing, could be considered. The Clerk is to write accordingly.

Correspondence: communications are still proceeding with Swale Borough Council's Planning Enforcement Team concerning an alleged 'Change of Use' offence in the village.

Mr Bowles gave details of the ongoing Parish Grant funding - there is a possible source from Kent County Council. The Clerk is to call Mr Bowles's personal aide at County Hall for the necessary application forms.

This will be a rare opportunity so make a note of the dates in your diary;



FROM THE VICAR

I have come up with a new invention which will help us all to know who to vote for at our forthcoming general election.



It is a computer where we type in all the policies that we agree with or are important to us and then the answer comes up telling us which party best fulfils our preferences.

It can be difficult to know who to vote for when elections come round. In my previous parish our local MP was a Christian; at the hustings (organised by the church), he was obviously the best candidate to be our constituency MP but for many he belonged to the 'wrong' party. In that situation one had to decide whether to vote for a man or a party.

We do have to try and engage with hopeful that this election will see a

the issues and make an informed decision based not primarily on what is best for me but what is best for our country and our world. We also need to pay attention to the underlying beliefs and values of the individual candidates.

It is easy to feel apathetic about politics, all the sound bites, the point scoring, the sleaze, the negative campaigning, to mention just a few of the things that may turn us off but Christians have a responsibility to be involved in politics and to vote.

Alan Beith, who was one time deputy leader of the Liberal Democrat Party is a Christian and he wrote that, "Apathy is not a Christian virtue. There is a primary Christian responsibility - duty - to act responsibly and that usually means voting, and doing so with careful consideration." You probably know the guote, attributed to Edmund Burke, the 18th century political thinker, "The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing." In 2001 only 59.4% of the UK population voted, in 2005 it was 61.4%, this contrasts with at least 70% from 1955 onwards. I am higher turnout because who wins is not a foregone conclusion (as it was in 2005 hence the low turnout) and there is a possibility of a hung parliament. Democracy is not to be taken for granted and no vote is wasted, please make sure you vote on Thursday 6th May.

You may be interested in the activities of my son and daughter. Davina is a pupil at Kent College and studies part time at Trinity College of Music, London. Last summer Davina was a participant in one 'Youth Music Theatre's shows,

"According to Brian Haw". This was staged at the Barbican Theatre, Plymouth. The show, devised and directed by Eddie Latter, but incorporating ideas from the cast, was based on the life and experiences of Brian Haw who's protest camp is outside the House of Commons. He began his protest against the war in

Iraq nine years ago and was voted, "Most inspiring political figure" at the 2007 Channel 4 political awards. The cast was pleased to be involved in a musical that had a political message; unusual for this

involved in a musical that litical message; unusua type of production. Following the initial performances, the cast has taken the show to the NASUWT (Teachers' Union) Congress in the International Conference Centre, Birmingham.

Davina has also successfully auditioned for a new Youth Music Theatre show, "New Dawn". This is a contemporary rock-vampire musical that is to be performed at the Aberdeen Youth Festival on the 1st and 2nd August this year. The previous musical showcased at the festival was transferred to a London West End Theatre over the Christmas period last year.

Her brother Jasper, has also had success at Youth Theatre. He was picked by Alan Ayckbourn, out of nearly 2,000 hopefuls, to be one of his principals in "Orvin, Champion of Champions" which Alan Ayk-

bourn directed in the Stephen Joseph Theatre, Scarborough. Jasper then appeared in the Youth Music Theatre's production of "Amy's Wedding" with

Lcuy Griffiths. She went on to become Maid Marion in the BBC production of "Robin Hood". Jasper was in "The Count of Monte Christo" before going to the Royal Northern College of Music where he is studying composition. One of his pieces will be performed at St. Gregory's Centre for Music on Friday 14th May.
