UPCOMING EVENTS

Parish Council Meeting: Wednesday 25th November at 8:00pm in the Village Hall. Members of the public are welcome to attend.

NEWS FROM the MEETING

- •The Parish Council Meeting held on 28th October was attended by 6 Parish Councillors, 2 Borough Councillors and 29 members of the public.
- •A representative from 'Action with Communities in Rural Kent' attended the Parish Council meeting to discuss the results of the recent housing needs survey. The results

showed that there is a need in the Parish for some affordable housing and the Parish Council will arrange a further meeting to discuss the matter in more detail before deciding on whether to progress the matter.

- •KCC have made some repairs to the sinking areas of road near the junction of Church Hill/Staplestreet.
- •Three planning applications were discussed at the Parish Council meeting: 4/500654/OPDEV Notice of Appeal against Enforcement Notice Without planning permission the permanent stationing of a Snack Wagon with extended lean-to on land adjoining the slip road at Thanet Way, Dargate (Pitstop Cafe). The Parish Council agreed to write to the Planning Inspectorate with a letter of support for the enforcement notice. Details of the appeal are

The Parish Council recorded no objection to the application. 15/507844/FULL -Change of use of land for 6 gypsy and traveller pitches, each pitch having one mobile home, a day room and space for one touring van; Hardstandings, means of enclosure and landscaping and ancillary childrens' play area. Evaluna, Plumpudding Lane. The Parish Council recorded an objection to the application. Swale Borough Council planning team have made site visits to both the Red Lion and Evaluna regarding building activity on/in the vicinity of both sites which has not yet been approved.

YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

I am covering a longer than usual period with this message due partly to the usual quiet August holiday period, then a very busy period with many meetings and little time to collect my thoughts and write this report.

Local Government is a roller coaster of highs and lows, wins and losses. Having just persuaded the Joint Transport Board to rethink the yellow lines in Boughton in line with local opinion as referred to in my last update we then had Highway England's ridiculous proposal to close Brogdale Road, Ospringe at the motorway bridge in the height of Despite the fruit picking season. the combined efforts of Ospringe Parish Council, local farmers, myself and even the Kent County Council Cabinet Member, Whitehall could not be budged!

Parish Councils and their members have always been integral to the way I work with residents in my

County Division. The breakdown in relations with two of them this Autumn concerned me greatly. With one which can remain nameless the problem was due to a change of Clerk and was easily sorted. The other is more difficult. For some reason the new Parish Council in Selling, where I live, does not appear to want involvement with or by its Borough and County Members whether for personal or political reasons. I could, of course, just accept the lack of sight of Agenda's, Minutes etc and the opportunity to advise, but I believe the losers would be the residents of Selling who would, in my opinion, receive a lesser level of service both from myself and their Parish Council.

On a brighter note since my last report I have attended Parish Council Meetings at Selling! Hernhill (twice), Ospringe (twice), Dunkirk (twice), Newnham, Graveney and Boughton. I have also chaired the Perry Wood Steering Group in Sell-

ing and attended the Faversham and Swale East Local Engagement Forum. These local meetings are in addition to Full Council and numerous Committee Meetings at both County and Swale. I have also spent five full days Chairing Home to School Transport Appeal Panels. Other meetings have included Swale Health and Wellbeing Board, Kent Council Leaders, South East England Councils, Southern Regional Flood & Coastal Committee in Worthing, Chairing the Kent Environmental Champions Group meeting as well as that with Swale Police and the National Farmers Union regarding rural policing in Swale. I have also attended two meetings of England's District Council Leaders held in London.

Please feel free to contact me at any time if I can assist with any matter especially those which fall within the responsibility of Kent County Council, such as Social Services, Highways, Education, Public Rights of Way and Public Health or those which fall within the remit of the Borough Council such as Development Control, Waste Collection, Sports Provision, Local Plans, Electoral Registration Environmental and Health Inspections. Currently I am expecting the usual number of contacts from residents concerning Schools allocations and refusal of

free home to school transport which always peak at this time of year. There is also a current ongoing consultation by KCC as to street lighting, if you feel strongly as to the risks, benefits, environmental or cost implications please register your opinion.

I will, as usual, be holding a participatory budgeting event to allocate community grant funds within the Swale East Division, venue and date to be confirmed. If you are involved in the running of any Village or Community Hall, Sports Club, Arts or Community Group or indeed any organisation which serves the residents of Swale East Division please contact Bill Ronan at

"KNOWN UNTO GOD"

(WW1 Headstone Inscription) We heard the distinctive sound of the aeroplane engine while we were inside the church in Rochester for a training day a few weeks ago. Helpfully, a tea break was announced as the speaker recognised he suddenly had some serious competition for our attention, and there was a rush to get outside. Standing on the grass, faces turning skyward in all directions as we searched the blue, shielding our eyes from the sun and THERE! - a Spitfire, climbing and manoeuvring, looping and turning. An event marking the 75th anniversary of the Battle of Britain.

I'm too young to remember WW2

and this pivotal air battle. But I carry some of the stories of those who lived through it; learned at school and from television and books, and more personally, from my grand-parent's own experiences.

Stories and memories help us to understand where we've come from, and why things are as they are. As the years pass, and the number of people who hold a living memory of WW2 diminishes, stories become ever more important. Of course, the history books tell us about the famous personalities and political events of the time. Yet over 66,000 war memorials exist in the United Kingdom and most of the names on these monuments never made it into the history books. But

each individual had their own important story, albeit one known only by those close to them. A life story that was cut short as they worked, fought and died as part of the deadliest conflict in human history.

This year, as every year, we will remember them; on Remembrance Sunday (8th November) and on 11th November at the 11th hour, marking the end of WW1.

As a Christian, I believe we need not fear our own stories being forgotten. Yes, time will pass, whole generations will pass away and human memories will fade. Most of us won't be remembered by history for our heroic or remarkable contribution to society – our lives will be

meaningful mainly to us and to those around us. And yet, Christians believe each human being whether celebrated or anonymous in life and death, each and every one of us is more fully known by eternal God than we could ever understand ourselves or be known by others. Ultimately, our own unique lives and stories are part of God's greater story. A story where God's love for humanity was so strong, that he gave himself in Jesus Christ, so we can know his love better.

To be fully known, and fully loved, even beyond time? That's a story worth telling.

In April 1916, Faversham and East Kent was rocked by a massive explosion. The gunpowder factory at Oare had blown up killing 106


people. Some from this Village. It was the biggest single local tragedy of World War 1.

The centenary of this horrific event is being marked by the making of a 45 minute film which is to be premiered at St Barnabas in Boughton, Saturday 7th November at 7.00pm.

I understand that County Councillor Andrew Bowles is going to put a 'Stop Notice' on the activities at the site. This will allow more time to organise opposition.

We seem to be racing up towards Christmas and all those lists of things to be done. One of them is trying to find presents without repeating what you have sent before (if you can remember). Something that will help is the Craft fair at the church. The fair last year was most successful at providing a wide range of gifts for friends and family. I have no doubt that this years will be just as good.
