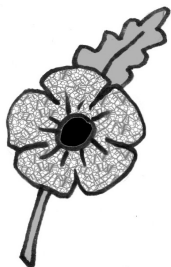

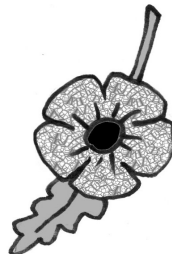

PARISH COUNCIL (SEPTEMBER)

The monthly meeting of the Council took place on 29th September. With the exception of Mr Elliott and Mrs Martin, who both sent apologies for absence, all Councillors were present, as were Mr Bowles and the Clerk.

Matters arising: no remedial

work appears to have been carried out on the Drove Lane footpath, where operations on it in the summer have left a two feet gap between the two ends. The KCC Footpaths Officer is aware of the problem.

The ongoing complaints about the blocked drains at Dargate may be approaching a result. Af-

ter a pointless effort by Highways staff, where six shovelfuls of mud were taken from the top of a drain, and deposited on the other side of the road, Councillor Bobbin was informed. He again contacted KCC Highways, and it was reported at the meeting that a full-scale operation seemed to be about to start, a few hundred yards further along the site of the original complaint. Councillors expressed an opinion that perhaps all of the drainage was to be investigated in the Dargate area. Communal breaths will not be held. Appreciative thanks are to be passed to Councillor Bobbin for his efforts in this matter.

Mr Morsman said that similar difficulties are being experienced in the Oakwell area, and Highways seem to be either incapable or unwilling, or both, of curing the problem. He also reported that the top cover of a drain in the New Zealand area is missing, and this has been reported. Councillors spoke of the increase of fly tipping in the whole parish. A huge pile of conifer tree topplings has been left on the Black Oast, Dargate road, which has obviously been abandoned by a non-resident of the parish. The usual favourite site - the Wey Street flyover - also figures largely under this heading. A sack of builder's rubbish was dealt with by another fly tipper, who emp-

tyed the sack and went off with it.

Mr Chapman said that a further meeting is to be arranged with the Amicus organisation, regarding the parking problems at Manor Cottages. In connection with this, the Clerk reported that he been speaking to the Police Community Support Officer, Angela Burden. Ms Burden said that she had already been to Hernhill, where she had visited the school and made herself known to the pupils. She also added that she was aware of the Manor Cottages problem, and would herself be attending the next meeting arranged by Amicus. She also expressed a wish to attend a Council meeting., the earlier the better. Although Councillors welcomed the idea, it was considered that she be asked to come to the November meeting - her visit would be well-advertised in the October Hernhill News (in the absence of a September edition) and may encourage the public to attend.

Mrs Figgis announced that the school urgently required another container, for the storage of fete equipment etc. Planning permission would be sought. Mr Chapman expressed misgivings - he felt that more construction work at the site would be followed by even more but the Chairman assured him that this would be the

final application.

the Chairman declared the meeting to be closed at 8.55 p.m.

PARISH COUNCIL (OCTOBER)

The monthly meeting of the Parish Council was held on 27th October. All Councillors and the Clerk were present. Apologies for absence were sent by Mr Bowles. The minutes of the previous Council meeting were signed as a true record. The sole matter arising was that remedial work on the drains of the Parish is being attended to, albeit slowly.

Reports: Mr Elliott said that the price of paper for the printing of the Hernhill News continued to rise. He is investigating a fresh source and will report back at the next meeting when he has made further enquiries.

Mrs Taylor reported on a planning application for attention to established trees in the Dargate area, which is a Conservation Area. The Parish Council has called in the services of the Village Tree Warden, Michael Woods. (Mr Woods was appointed to the post by the Kent Men of the Trees Organisation, and has many years experience in arboriculture). His opinion that some of the trees concerned are overhanging the highway, but this could be dealt with by crown lifting. The application does not specify whether the

trees are to be crown lifted or felled, and the Clerk is to write to Swale Borough Council Planning Services, asking for far more detail before any work is begun at the site.

Mrs Figgis complained of excessive mud on the road at Wey Street. She has contacted Swale Borough Council, Kent Highways and, in desperation, the police. All of these bodies were of no use and the Clerk is to call in the services of Mr Bowles.

It was reported that a sheep, which had escaped from its pen, caused many problems before it had to be shot. The Parish Council would like to remind those persons who own, or are responsible for stock of any description that care should be taken to ensure that the animals are suitably enclosed in well-maintained fencing or hedges.

The parking at Wellside was discussed. The three spaces for residents at these premises are solely for those residents to whom some respect should be shown over the parking situation. Mr Chapman said that he had visited Hernhill Nursery at Waterham. He was certain that there would not be problems with flood at the site, and, by and large,

found the site to be satisfactory. Mr Morsman reported that the two posts on the Village Green which had been stolen had now been replaced.

No adverse comments were offered on the following recent planning applications: Kemsdals Stud Farm, Kemsdale Road - side and rear extension; Victory Wood, Dargate Road - relocation of access; Mount Farmhouse, Staple Street Road - single storey side extension.

Carillion is a new contractor bidding for KCC Highways Maintenance contract. The Company will be given details of what

needs to be done, some of which has been outstanding for more than five years. Whichever bidder is successful can only be an improvement Correspondence: the police have contacted the Council, wishing to patrol the village allotments, of which we have none. However, the Police Community Support Officer will attend the next meeting of the Council on 24th November, when all interested persons will be welcome. The meeting will start at 8.00 p.m.

There being no further business, the Chairman declared the meeting to be closed at 9.10 p.m.

FROM THE VICAR

"If a doctor diagnosed you had an illness that required you to build twenty minutes of therapy into your day, every day, without fail, otherwise you'd die most people would manage it." That was a Benedictine monk, Father Christopher Jamison, best known from the television series, 'The Monastery', speaking in a new series that began on BBC2 last week. He then went on to say, "The question is, can we believe that about the life of the soul? Actually our souls will die if we don't give them some breathing space every day." This new series is called 'The

Big Silence' where five people from a variety of backgrounds spend eight days in silent retreat with the Jesuits in St Beuno's in Wales. All of them, like most of us, are busy people, who find it almost, if not totally impossible to find silence in their own daily lives, Father Christopher spoke about an 'epidemic of busyness.' How they cope with silence we wait to see but the signs are not good.

We all need breathing space whether it's time out, silence or some peace and quiet but with Christmas fast approaching any hope of peace and quiet is fast receding. However, one of my

theories is that we make time for what we see as important. We make time to eat and drink otherwise we would die, if we saw silence as vital to the life of our soul or inner being we would make time for it, even if only a few minutes each day.

It is relatively easy for me to have silence at home, I know people live in far more chaotic households than mine, and each person has to find their own pattern of silence and reflection, but I usually spend the beginning of each day in a time

of silence, prayer and bible reading, not because I'm a priest but because I'm a Christian. In silence we meet our inner self and we meet with God, how can God communicate with us if we never make space to listen? It can be scary as the five people in 'The Big Silence' will discover but as Father Christopher said, "We meet God in the silence, it just works like that, it appears to be one of the laws of the universe."

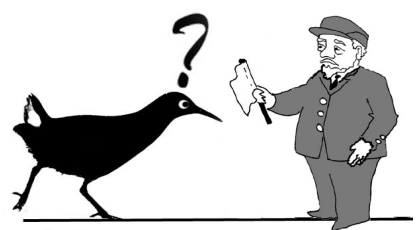
But onwards

take your questions and hear any views you might have. All are invited to attend.

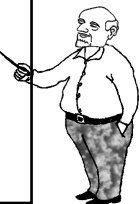
